The needs for safety, belonging, love relations, and for respect, can be satisfied only by other people... ~ Abraham Maslov

Belonging is the theme of this month. American psychologist Abraham Maslov, in 1943, proposed a hierarchy of human need. The goal was to clarify what needs must be met to ensure human wellbeing. I imagine this is familiar to many. Of course, the most basic level of need is for food and water. After that, the need to feel safe. One tier above that is love and belonging. To thrive, we need to feel loved and to belong. And so, in the precious span of our lives, we are far better, healthier and more alive, when we engage with one another. Belonging builds resilience. We can use this to care for ourselves in these most interesting and challenging times.

This is why we engage in a spiritual community, to belong and to find meaning. It is good to consider this as we begin again how is it that we might be true to our mission to cultivate more love in the world and nurture more love for the world? When we do this, each in our own way, we help bring about a world of more love. I tell you this as a reminder that even our smallest gestures of compassion, recognition, or greeting - matter. Mindfully fulfilling these needs is good reason to engage, a good reason to belong to each other, a good reason to welcome one another into this circle of caring. Our country and our community need this now more than ever, to combat an epidemic of loneliness and remind one another of our shared humanity. This, I think, is what's needed to save the world. If we as a people cannot meet this need for love and belonging, we will sink further into a place where healthcare, food, and safety are even more threatened. This, my friends, is something we are uniquely equipped to address.

So, welcome as we start off our regular services and offerings once again in September. Welcome for the first time or maybe for the hundredth time. Welcome in person or online. Welcome to the children, welcome to our elders, and all those in between. We are an intentional community of varied ages who strive to care for one another and the wider world. We are, after all, in this together. I'm so glad to be in this with you.

September Outreach Offering

The Outreach committee has been working on our list of recipients for the 2025-2026 year with a focus on those non-profits who have lost federal money in the chaos of this year. Our September offering will be to support the work of Plymouth Head Start program.

Head Start is a federally funded, family-focused child development program for children ages 3-5 that is free for income eligible households. The program offers a center-focused classroom where kids attend daily five days a week with meals provided. There are staff who meet with families to assist with social services.

I found today that they have indeed lost federal funding in the chaotic budgeting this year. On September 21, one of the staff will join us to tell us more about this program.

Climate Action

IMPORTANT CONFERENCE HELD AT STARR KING UU FELLOWSHIP ON AUGUST 23, 2025

The New Hampshire Network for Environment, Energy, Climate presented their 4th Annual Environmental Summit in our Meetinghouse. This is the second year this Summit has been held at our Meetinghouse. Representatives from NH nonprofit organizations working on climate-related issues from across our state gathered for this meeting.

With critical funding being cut and clawed back by our Government, those assembled discussed how NH's environmental community can maintain momentum to protect our environmental values. The Summit provided role models of folks who refuse to be deterred.

This year the focus was on advancing environmental projects in our own local communities. It has become increasingly clear that this local emphasis is more likely to win support for projects, educate fellow-citizens, and bring folks on board as volunteers, creating an engaged and cohesive community.

The NH Network, as it is known, is an all-volunteer, nonpartisan group sharing information about actions on environmental challenges to help create a more sustainable New Hampshire. Our Fellowship's Climate Action Committee has been able to keep abreast of the numerous climate-related actions taking place by nonprofits in our State because of the information made available to all by the NH Network.

Among the speakers at this year's Summit was Laurene Allen, Goldman Environmental Prize winner, whose persistence and investigation brought PFAS to public attention, eventually leading to Saint-Gobain's exit from Merrimack NH. PFAS refers to the so-called "forever chemicals" in our environment that can cause cancer and other ailments. Saint-Gobain manufactured plastics in the town of Merrimack which allowed PFAS waste into the ground and drinking water of several communities, with significant cancer-related illnesses and death. PFAS is a health concern across New Hampshire, a significant threat for people living near the large commercial landfills in our State.

Some of you might remember one of the other speakers at the Summit, Aubrey Nelson (her picture at left below). As she told a few of us at the end of the Summit, "I grew up in this Fellowship." A member of the Nelson family from Moultonborough. Aubrey represented two young-adult groups, the NH and VT Energy Education Projects. During her presentation Aubrey encouraged the audience to include children and young adults in climate projects.

Date with Death Club: Exploring Mortality in Community

Starting Sunday, September 21

Perhaps you are one of the many humans seeking to explore mortality with less fear and more curiosity; with less euphemism and more reality; with less conformity and more creativity. If so, welcome! So glad you found the Date with Death Club!

Date with Death Club is a secular/non-dogmatic exploration of mortality in community, including philosophical, spiritual and informational content, with a balance of humor and earnest regard for the topic of mortality. This program provides a safe[r] and brave[r] space to explore the often-taboo topic of our mortality. This program aspires to cultivate the possibility of living a more awake life by facing the reality of our death. When taken as a whole, sessions provide concrete information and the chance to deepen self- awareness and strengthen emotional resilience.

Each session stands on its own, supporting drop-in participation; all sessions complement each other, supporting the cultivation of connection and community among participants. More frequent attendance will provide benefits of deepening interpersonal connection and personal understanding. You are welcome to attend sessions that you've participated in the past, much that these sessions offer are worth a second look.






The Resistance Network is an opportunity to live our values as Unitarian Universalists and take collective action.


