Soundbites

The Pathway to Creativity.

When Rev. Linda and I started looking at this Soul Matters theme for May, it struck me that this might be the topic that resonates the most with me. As I have stated before, I consider myself a "generalist" when it comes to music; I don't feel like I excel at any one genre or instrument, but am able to spread appreciation for the broad spectrum that encompasses the art.

I grew up in an old Presbyterian church in Brunswick, Georgia that valued music – at least enough so to host an amazing pipe organ, a grand piano and a functioning adult choir. There was not, however, the resource or interest to have a children's choir, so I went down the street to the Methodist Church to participate in that group. Yet, my home church always welcomed me when I wanted to play in a Sunday service. Whether it be flute, piano, or singing I was allowed to follow my path to creativity in the worship venue. In high school, I was entrusted with a key to the church building so that I might go and play the piano anytime I wanted. What a gift!

One of the things I enjoy exploring is improvisation. It usually takes form in a hymn whereby I change the tempo, or the key or the texture. Often when the Starr King choir is preparing to join me, I am asked "how many times are we going to sing the ending, etc.." to which I usually reply "Until the Spirit moves me to end." Live Music is one of those arts that takes shape in the moment, and once the creativity is spent, the moment passes and all that is left is the impact on the listeners and the creators.

This is what I hope to impart to our children, youth and adults who participate in the music ministry at Starr King. An opportunity to explore their own individual and collective creativity while learning the value of sharing that gift with those gathered – even if for that brief moment in time.



Climate Action News

What we can do in the Plymouth area to recycle soft plastic.

As reported previously to you in this space, our Fellowship's Climate Action Committee has been considering for some time what actions we might take to recycle soft plastic, all those plastic bags and wrappers that surround so much of what we buy. Best not to buy those products at all of course, and many of us do use alternative products or wrapping where we can. But somehow, many of those soft plastic bags and wrappers persist in coming into our homes.

We've learned about the successful collections of soft plastic that are held regularly at the UU Laconia church. The plastic is recycled by Trex, a company that makes products from the plastic. The collection process has grown to become a city-wide effort in Laconia, with many volunteers and businesses involved. Our Fellowship members who live at the Taylor Community are part of this effort. We are in awe of what has been accomplished by those dedicated volunteers.

With consideration to the enormous commitment that has evolved there in Laconia, we hesitate to try to start something similar in the Plymouth area because there are elements in the process requiring much time and effort, including the massive communications that are necessary for each collection.

However, Trex, has established local drop-off locations, including one located at Market Basket in Plymouth. Look for the **NexTrex** bin when you shop there!

Following is a list of soft plastic that Trex will accept: pallet wrap, stretch film grocery bags, bread bags, dry cleaning bags, newspaper sleeves, Ziploc and other resealable food storage bags, produce bags, plastic covering on paper towels, air pillows, bubble wrap, shipping envelopes, wraps around electronics, films labeled with #2 or #4 recycling symbol, ice bags, wood pellet bags, salt bags, cereal box liners. Note: all plastic must be clean, dry and free of food residue.

<u>Trex cannot recycle the following plastic items</u>: frozen food bags, candy bar wrappers, potato chip bags, net or mesh produce bags, degradable/compostable bags, pre-washed salad mix bags, pet food bags, hot dog or meat wrap packaging, six-pack rings, PPE gloves, masks, or protective wear, pool covers, silage and hay bags, vinyl shower curtains or tablecloths, shiny, crinkly films like floral wrap.





We are not affiliated with any sect or religion, however we often follow meditations in the Buddhist tradition of Thich Nhat Hanh, Jack Kornfield, Pema Chodron and the like. We generally get together at 6 for brief hellos and pertinent comments. Then a facilitator for the week will offer a short reading or discussion on a meditation topic, followed by a guided meditation, related to the topic. The meditation can be anywhere between 20 and 40 minutes. Afterward we have a short debriefing and discussion of the experience. We adjourn at 7. There is no designated leader of the group and there is no effort to persuade anyone to any point of view.

We welcome newcomers to our group. This group is free and requires no dues or contributions. No previous meditation experience necessary.
