#### Resistance is the first step to change.

Welcome to April my friends! A season of true transition to spring, a true shifting of the weather, the sun's intensity, and, frankly, my spirits. COVID did finally make a lingering visit to my household. Mark and I are just fine, we weathered it well. Thank you to all who-from a distance - offered their good wishes. I know many of you have been through similar circumstances.

Our Soul Matters theme for April is The Path of Resistance. This quote, "Resistance is the first step to change," is so very true. True, whether you're trying to change yourself, your relationships, an organization, or the world. Resistance is the first step to change. It's especially true when we're suffering changes we did not want or expect - resistance is typically our first response.

Even when change is a thing we might want, we're cautious. Wisdom, when it comes to us, offers trust that we can navigate change and that on the other side there might be good things we have yet to imagine. I believe that is true for our community. This month we're welcoming new members to sign our membership book. These good changes were brought about because you welcomed them and made them part of this community. Good things, unexpected things, can come from change.

This is my invitation to you and to myself to use resistance wisely. I know that resistance is the first response to change but let us not let it be our only response. 
#### Stewardship 2023

#### President's Letter—April 2023

Spring has arrived: snow is melting, crocuses have appeared in my front yard, milder daytime temperatures and days are longer. Many of us begin to think of projects to do "in the spring." Starr King Fellowship's Furnishing Task force projects are close to finished-new furniture in the entry foyer, new flooring on the lower level, with new furniture and bookshelves, and new easy-to-read name tags that fit neatly in the rack. Many thanks for the anonymous and generous donations that made this possible.

Spring also means the focus must turn to the budget process for next year. The Stewardship pledge drive revealed that some families (referred to as pledging units) increased the amount of their pledges, but the number of pledging units AND membership total have dropped significantly. Your generosity and pledging to support the Fellowship is greatly appreciated as always. Pledges and donations are the primary source of income for our programs, staffing, building/maintenance, operating expenses, etc.

Expenses have risen for everyone, and the fellowship is feeling the strain as well. We have no mortgage on our building and take excellent care of it, but costs for utilities and maintenance continue to rise no matter what. Operating expenses, such as office and cleaning supplies, computers/technology, and more continue to rise. We value our wonderful staff, but this value comes with additional expenses beyond our control.

The finance committee has worked diligently to reduce expenses to balance with projected income and presented a deficit budget, for a third consecutive year, for the board to review at our most recent meeting. The board strongly feels this information needs to be provided to you prior to our annual meeting on May 21, 2023, following the worship service. We want you to be informed NOW.

We are hosting an open discussion Sunday, April 30, following the worship service, for an informational presentation on the budget and to ask for your help-perhaps make an additional donation, increase your pledges, whatever you can do will help. I hope you can plan to attend and continue to support the work of the fellowship like you have so generously done thus far. This will be held both in-person and via Zoom.

#### **Soundbites**

Resistance. When Rev. Linda and I were planning for the month of April, we talked about this theme and what it could mean in worship. Initially, I was actively "resistant" to the challenge, to say the least.

Then, I started to think about my love of Sci-Fi movies and what resistance means in different context. In the Star Trek movies, the evil Borg take over the bodies of humans and the catch line is "resistance is futile". In my beloved Star Wars series, The "good guys", the "light side of the Force" are known as "The Resistance" as they battle against the Empire and the Dark Side of the Force. In the Christian calendar, we are in the season of Lent, whereby Jesus wandered in the desert for 40 days and nights, all the while practicing resistance against temptation by the "Devil". Those who give up something for Lent are practicing resistance against a chosen food, or language or whatever seems to be a weakness or a challenge.

In music, there are times when the composer will write in a suspension that usually resolves into the key of the piece. This tension could be seen as a resistance to stay in the given tone, yet it almost always moves into the ease of what it "should be" musically.

The choir is working on a difficult choral piece by Maine composer Malcolm Dalglish based on the famous poem by Wendell Berry. Musically, the piece starts in one key and ends in an entirely different key, thus never resolving to the original tone. No resistance (though plenty of dissonances); only change. The text begins; "When despair for the world flows in me, and I wake in the night at the least sound, in fear of what my life and my children's lives may be. I go and lie down where the wood drake rests.....and am free."

Maybe resistance is simply taking oneself out of the noise of the world in order to just 'be'. For me, I am looking forward to exploring this with all of you at Starr King, and will be trying not to balk!

#### **April Outreach Collection:**

#### **COMMON MAN FOR UKRAINE**

Our April outreach collection will offer a unique opportunity to support and assist Ukrainian refugee children who have faced displacement and trauma.

Your contribution will help provide and maintain:

- Counseling services for traumatized children
- A bloodmobile which is deployed in eastern Ukraine to distribute blood to field hospitals
- Funds to feed Ukrainian orphans and displaced children
- Clothing for children

In 2022, following a trip abroad to create connections, nearly \$ 2.5 million was raised locally and sent to partners abroad to purchase and deliver the above resources.

The goal for this year is to raise \$10 million.

<u>Commonmanforukraine.org</u> was created in 2022 and works with Rotary organizations, both local and international. It was organized by Alex Ray and Lisa Mure (Common Man) and Steve Rand and Susan Mathieson (Rand's Hardware).

The funds we raise will be sent locally to <u>commonmanforukraine.org</u>. Donations may be made by using the donate button on Starr King's home page, placing a check in the collection plate any week in April (and be sure to write Ukraine in the memo field), or placing cash in the collection plate on the designated Sunday (to be announced...). #### Meditation Group, Mondays at 6 p.m.

Our meditation group meets every Monday from 6 to 7 pm in the upstairs foyer. We are a small informal group that shares an abiding interest in meditation. Usually, we have between 5 and 10 participants. We are not affiliated with any sect or religion, however we often follow meditations in the Buddhist tradition of Thich Nhat Hanh, Jack Kornfield, Pema Chodron and the like. We generally get together at 6 for brief hellos and pertinent comments. Then a facilitator for the week will offer a short reading or discussion on a meditation topic, followed by a guided meditation, related to the topic. The meditation can be anywhere between 20 and 40 minutes. Afterward we have a short debriefing and discussion of the experience. We adjourn at 7. There is no designated leader of the group and there is no effort to persuade anyone to any point of view.

We welcome newcomers to our group. This group is free and requires no dues or contributions. No previous meditation experience necessary.



### About Membership in Starr King Unitarian Universalist Fellowship

#### What it Means to be a Member
