Minister's Newsletter November 2023

The meaning of life is to find your gift.

The purpose of life is to give it away.

~ Pablo Picasso

The world is challenging as news, both domestic and abroad, feels foreboding. It may also feel like there is little we can do. But I am going to offer a bit of advice, find your meaning and purpose and lean into that. The meaning of life, says Picasso, is to find your gift. To this, I would add the imperative that we recognize the worth of our gifts. Perhaps you are good at numbers, at recognizing patterns, seeing trends, and making quick decisions based on numerical evidence or fixing computers. Or say you are good with design; you see color and coordination; you can make a physical space come alive with a touch of tender loving attention. Or perhaps you have the gift of voice either singing or speaking, your words and music can claim the attention of all in the room. Or maybe you are creative, you paint, bake, or knit, do wood working, your meaning-making comes from using your hands. Nearly all of us underestimate the worth of our gifts and often take them for granted. Picasso went on to say the purpose of life is to give it away. This is where our November theme of generosity comes to mind, this is how we give away our gifts. It is in the uniqueness of our gifts that we make a difference. Whether you do this here or beyond our doors, thank you. It is my joy to witness the ways our gifts together make for a kinder, more loving world. When the weight of the world grows heavy, this is what I am going to do, look at the gifts I have, and give them away. This, I think, is a sane response to challenging times, recognize your gifts and give

In this same thought, I invite you to support yourself with the gifts of others. Just because you don't bake doesn't mean you don't eat cake. We can lack the gift of aesthetics and still appreciate beauty. We can let others be kind to us as a means to spread love. I think sometimes we forget to notice all the good that others bring our way, we take it for granted. I vow to pay attention to the ways we gift to one another. This too is a sane response to the challenges of the world.

My friends, there are many good gifts in our community. In honor of our theme for the month I invite you to recognize the generosity all around you and offer your gratitude. I'll start. I have heard many of us use the word "Community" when we talk about Starr King Fellowship, myself included. In the online book Conversational Leadership by David Gurteen, Community can be defined as follows: a group of people who...

- have shared core values

Climate Action Committee

On October 15 speakers from the Citizens' Climate Lobby (CCL), John Gage, the NH Coordinator, and Wharton Sinkler, the Lakes Region Chapter Leader, presented the latest information concerning the work CCL is doing to make the case for putting a price on carbon. 29 people were in attendance.

The two speakers spoke clearly and convincingly that with respect to climate change:

- •the greatest problem is fossil fuels (coal, oil, gas)
- •the reduction we need in greenhouse gas emissions, 50% by 2030, cannot happen without putting a price on carbon. A map of the world was presented, showing a surprising number of countries (including most of the provinces of Canada) who have either implemented a price on carbon, or are scheduled to do so. The point is made by CCL that carbon pricing is inevitable. But when and how we do it matters greatly.
- •the CCL carbon fee and dividend proposal is structured to be both effective and socially responsible. Here, in few words, is their proposal: a fee is placed on fossil fuels at the source and all monies collected, minus administrative costs, are returned to American households. Under this proposal the dividend amount is the same to all. About 2/3 of all households will break even or receive more in their monthly dividend than they will pay in higher prices due to the fee, thereby protecting middle-income and helping low-income households. Those most harmed by climate change would benefit the most.

A model called EN-ROADS, developed by a group at MIT, was briefly shown by John Gage to demonstrate how important it is to focus on the reduction of greenhouse gases. The demonstration revealed that putting a price on carbon reduces the earth's temperature, *far* more than any other single policy option. EN-ROADS is available online at no cost and is easy to navigate.

Your Climate Action Committee is planning to invite our Fellowship's members and friends to a letter or post card writing session at our Meetinghouse so we can effectively address our state and national representatives. We will provide all the writing materials so all you will need to do is compose and drop your letter or post card off at your local post office. The session will probably be held a few months from now, when state and national legislative proposals related to climate change are expected to receive more attention than they do now. Watch this space.

Members of your Climate Action Committee are eager to have discussions with you as our work moves forward. Your feedback is needed and appreciated.

We will leave the lower parking lot at Starr King at 11:30 AM after the service. Contact Deedie at cdkriebel@gmail.com, if you plan to join us.

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


Breakfast Club Friday, November 3, 2023




BOOK GROUP NEWS

Meditation Group, Mondays at 6 p.m.

Our meditation group meets every Monday from 6 to 7 pm in the upstairs foyer. We are a small informal group that shares an abiding interest in meditation. Usually, we have between 5 and 10 participants. We are not affiliated with any sect or religion, however we often follow meditations in the Buddhist tradition of Thich Nhat Hanh, Jack Kornfield, Pema Chodron and the like. We generally get together at 6 for brief hellos and pertinent comments. Then a facilitator for the week will offer a short reading or discussion on a meditation topic, followed by a guided meditation, related to the topic. The meditation can be anywhere between 20 and 40 minutes. Afterward we have a short debriefing and discussion of the experience. We adjourn at 7. There is no designated leader of the group and there is no effort to persuade anyone to any point of view.

We welcome newcomers to our group. This group is free and requires no dues or contributions. No previous meditation experience necessary.

What it Means to be a Member

You are invited to become a member by participating in a Path to Membership orientation or by meeting with the Minister to review the benefits and responsibilities of membership. All new members sign the official Membership Record book witnessed by the Minister or a Membership Committee Chair.

Members are entitled to the services of the Minister and the use of the sanctuary for Rites of Passage (weddings, dedications, memorial services, etc.) at no cost. Members are eligible to serve in elected officer positions and serve as committee chairs. Members have the privilege of full voting rights.

Membership is maintained by active participation in the Fellowship, by supporting the annual Stewardship Drive and/or contributing service toward the Fellowship.

What it Means to be a Friend

A Friend of Starr King UU Fellowship is an individual in harmony with the visions, goals and principles of our Fellowship who chooses not to sign the Membership Record Book. A Friend may participate in any and all Fellowship activities but does not receive Rites of Passage services without a fee, is not eligible to vote or serve as an elected officer or committee chair.
