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Welcoming Congregation Renewal

LGBTQ+ people need to know they have our support, as human rights are being threatened daily. Our flag should be up to show our welcome, and to do that we must do the work of renewing our Welcoming Congregation status.

Yes, we did the work in 1999 to get certified as a Welcoming Congregation, but believe it or not, that was almost 25 years ago. A lot has changed in that time, and the Unitarian Universalist Association wants to know that we are keeping ourselves informed and active when it comes to welcoming people of all sexual orientations and gender identities.

The work ahead is not hard, and we've done a lot of it already. We need a small task force to guide us to becoming a welcoming congregation again. Our tasks involve making sure that we list LGBTQ Days of Observance in our newsletter, holding occasional workshops on topics important to keeping us up to date on issues related to the LGBTQ community, (a monthly article-read and discussion on transgender/non-binary youth, anyone?), and providing once-a-year financial support, which we can do using the Outreach basket with an organization that supports the LGBTQ community.

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President's Letter October 2023

We all use a variety of techniques for communicating with others, such as the good ol' telephone (primarily cell phones now!) to texting, email, social media formats, newsletters, announcements at the beginning on Sunday mornings, and conversations. It is good to know how busy our fellowship is in so many areas!

At the board retreat just over a year ago, your board brainstormed all that we are doing by using categories of Welcoming, Internal Communication, Education, Community Outreach, and Operations. Further work was done to eliminate duplication of several things and make the list a bit more manageable. This work is now moving to the next step, where a board liaison "checks" in with committees, staff, facilitators of groups, and others. The board liaison then reports at the monthly board meetings about how things are going with committees, etc. and areas where help is needed. As our year progresses, our fellowship gets very busy and the board hopes everyone will help in this area.

The categories (listed above) are flexible and will likely be refined as this work progresses. Welcoming includes smooth Sunday teams, membership committee, activities, dinners/gatherings, welcoming congregation and the liaison is Bob Chandler. Internal Communication includes the website, Zoom, Facebook, Simple Church, Sharepoint, Sunday morning announcements, newsletter and weekly view, etc. and at this time I am the liaison. Education includes the lifespan religious education program, including Sunday mornings, youth groups, Our Whole Lives, Coming of Age, Neighboring Faiths, nursery, service trips, etc.), religious education committee, Soul Matters, Date with Death Club, music and choir, and the liaison is Connie Maatta. Community Outreach includes social action work, such as climate justice and reproductive justice, committee chairs, book group, meditation group, and the liaison is Suellen Skinner. Operations include building and grounds committee, stewardship, safety, solar panel capital campaign, equipment, administration/staff, etc. The board agrees that finance committee would be within this final area but understands and accepts that financial updates are provided to the board via the treasurer's monthly reports.

Please help YOUR BOARD: reach out to the liaison in the area best suited. If unsure, ask any of us. Keep in mind that this is a *work in progress* and we want your input. Communication is always helpful.



BOOK GROUP NEWS


October 10, 3:30 Book Group

Meditation Group, Mondays at 6 p.m.

Our meditation group meets every Monday from 6 to 7 pm in the upstairs foyer. We are a small informal group that shares an abiding interest in meditation. Usually, we have between 5 and 10 participants. We are not affiliated with any sect or religion, however we often follow meditations in the Buddhist tradition of Thich Nhat Hanh, Jack Kornfield, Pema Chodron and the like. We generally get together at 6 for brief hellos and pertinent comments. Then a facilitator for the week will offer a short reading or discussion on a meditation topic, followed by a guided meditation, related to the topic. The meditation can be anywhere between 20 and 40 minutes. Afterward we have a short debriefing and discussion of the experience. We adjourn at 7. There is no designated leader of the group and there is no effort to persuade anyone to any point of view.

We welcome newcomers to our group. This group is free and requires no dues or contributions. No previous meditation experience necessary.

What it Means to be a Member

Membership is open to all individuals sixteen years and older regardless of race, creed, national origin, gender or sexual orientation who are in harmony with the visions, goals and principles of Starr King Unitarian Universalist Fellowship.

You are invited to become a member by participating in a Path to Membership orientation or by meeting with the Minister to review the benefits and responsibilities of membership. All new members sign the official Membership Record book witnessed by the Minister or a Membership Committee Chair.

Members are entitled to the services of the Minister and the use of the sanctuary for Rites of Passage (weddings, dedications, memorial services, etc.) at no cost. Members are eligible to serve in elected officer positions and serve as committee chairs. Members have the privilege of full voting rights.

Membership is maintained by active participation in the Fellowship, by supporting the annual Stewardship Drive and/or contributing service toward the Fellowship.

What it Means to be a Friend

A Friend of Starr King UU Fellowship is an individual in harmony with the visions, goals and principles of our Fellowship who chooses not to sign the Membership Record Book. A Friend may participate in any and all Fellowship activities but does not receive Rites of Passage services without a fee, is not eligible to vote or serve as an elected officer or committee chair.
