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





Climate Action Committee

On August 12th Nancy Chaddock attended an incredible climate Summit held in a large barn at Prescott Farm in Laconia. Incredible because about 70 people from all over our entire State came together for three hours on a sunny Saturday in this pleasant barn space to discuss the issues of climate change and what might be done together to make positive change here in New Hampshire. This large group of people represented a significant number of different organizations working on climate issues, including six State Representatives in the New Hampshire House. The networking opportunity this Summit provided will be valuable to the work going forward by your Climate Action Committee.

The first hour of the Summit was spent going around the circle for introductions. Then the attendees broke up into separate group discussions based on their stated interests, coming back together as a whole for the final hour, to share what was learned and how acting together could bring progress to our State.

Unitarian Universalists who were there made themselves and their interests known. Among those present was the Executive Director of Unitarian Universalist Action New Hampshire, Mo Baxley, with whom Nancy had a good conversation. A half dozen or so UU folks from around the State were in attendance. UU's were the only folks present who were representing a religious organization. The UU presence became so repetitive during introductions that one of the last individuals who introduced himself and his particular interest jokingly added as he sat down, "And *I'm* not a Unitarian Universalist."

Among the specific interests represented by those attending: single use plastic waste, environmental health, overhaul of the State Department of Environmental Services, water quality, elimination of greenhouse gas emissions, the fight to stop a privately owned giant landfill collecting waste from both NH and other states in Dalton NH, protection and restoration of old growth forests, and taking action on what is available to benefit municipalities directly as incentives for solar projects and energy efficiency for those municipalities that have not yet done so.

It was noted by many of those present at the Summit that climate change legislation is unfortunately stymied in New Hampshire, with the result that our State is far behind the progress being made elsewhere. One State Representative in the House emphasized, for example, that we don't yet have a carbon plan in place that would allow our state to be eligible for federal climate change funding. However, on the positive side it was also noted that some climate-related issues do have bipartisan support.

One participant sums up what was gained from the Summit: "I think when you are involved in one of these fights, you get very focused on your own issue. We can learn from each other and maybe empower each other and maybe accelerate some of the progress we need to make."

Here at our Fellowship in Plymouth your Climate Action Committee is looking forward to presenting its first major effort in this new fiscal year to generate interest and discussion relating to how we might act to help progress on climate issues in our State: on October 15 two major leaders of the Citizens' Climate Lobby in New Hampshire will speak to us (and to some other folks, hopefully, from our wider Plymouth community), following the Sunday service that day. Mark your calendar!

We currently have two Soul Matters sharing circles with a few openings yet remaining. These groups (of no more than 10 people) meet to explore the material provided in the monthly packets. Both groups meet online, via Zoom. One meets on the 3rd Tuesday of each month from 2:30 pm until 4:30 pm, and the second meets on the 4th Wednesday from 6:00 pm until 8:00 pm. If we have the interest, we'll look to open another group.

This year we're introducing another way to engage with the Soul Matters material. Each month we'll provide a Fellowship-wide spiritual practice related to our theme. You'll find this on our website as well as in the newsletter. Then, on the 4th Sunday of each month, at 11:00, you're invited to join others for *Soulful Sundays* a gathering for those who wish for further reflection and companionship around the spiritual practice. Give it a try!

September's Spiritual Practice:

Welcoming Gratefulness & The Present Moment

Welcoming the present moment is one of the most important of all spiritual practices. Yet, it's also one of the hardest. So, to make it a bit easier, we've put together a list of videos to help you. Plan some time to start your day by listening to one of these videos. You can journal after listening or just sit quietly with what the video opens for you. Think of this as a morning meditation. Be sure to give some thought to your surroundings. Listen while sitting at your kitchen table sipping your first cup of coffee or listen while sitting on your back porch looking out as the world wakes up. As you watch, pay attention to how beginning your day this way alters the way you travel through it. Consider journaling to capture your thoughts. Come to your group ready to share 2-3 examples of the difference the videos made.

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




Meditation Group, Mondays at 6 p.m.

Our meditation group meets every Monday from 6 to 7 pm in the upstairs foyer. We are a small informal group that shares an abiding interest in meditation. Usually, we have between 5 and 10 participants. We are not affiliated with any sect or religion, however we often follow meditations in the Buddhist tradition of Thich Nhat Hanh, Jack Kornfield, Pema Chodron and the like. We generally get together at 6 for brief hellos and pertinent comments. Then a facilitator for the week will offer a short reading or discussion on a meditation topic, followed by a guided meditation, related to the topic. The meditation can be anywhere between 20 and 40 minutes. Afterward we have a short debriefing and discussion of the experience. We adjourn at 7. There is no designated leader of the group and there is no effort to persuade anyone to any point of view.

We welcome newcomers to our group. This group is free and requires no dues or contributions. No previous meditation experience necessary.

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About Membership in Starr King Unitarian Universalist Fellowship

What it Means to be a Member

Membership is open to all individuals sixteen years and older regardless of race, creed, national origin, gender or sexual orientation who are in harmony with the visions, goals and principles of Starr King Unitarian Universalist Fellowship.

You are invited to become a member by participating in a Path to Membership orientation or by meeting with the Minister to review the benefits and responsibilities of membership. All new members sign the official Membership Record book witnessed by the Minister or a Membership Committee Chair.

Members are entitled to the services of the Minister and the use of the sanctuary for Rites of Passage (weddings, dedications, memorial services, etc.) at no cost. Members are eligible to serve in elected officer positions and serve as committee chairs. Members have the privilege of full voting rights.

Membership is maintained by active participation in the Fellowship, by supporting the annual Stewardship Drive and/or contributing service toward the Fellowship.

What it Means to be a Friend

A Friend of Starr King UU Fellowship is an individual in harmony with the visions, goals and principles of our Fellowship who chooses not to sign the Membership Record Book. A Friend may participate in any and all Fellowship activities but does not receive Rites of Passage services without a fee, is not eligible to vote or serve as an elected officer or committee chair.
