Minister's Newsletter

"Yes, transformation is often more about unlearning than learning...." ~ Richard Rohr

Our Soul Matters theme for this month is The Gift of Transformation. Transformation requires a letting go of control, a free fall of sorts, into the unknown. It is how we open into our more authentic selves. And I think it often comes about through no invitation or desire of our own. It comes when we suffer loss, when we change careers, retire, become a parent or when our grown children launch themselves fully into their own lives. Transformation happens when we wake up and find that who we were, like old clothes, no longer fits and who we are becoming is not yet comfortable. Ever feel like that? It's scary. Somehow, I imagine that only really mature, enlightened people willingly let go, willingly welcome transformation. Most of us, me included, are transformed by life itself, by those things which we truly have no control over. Transformation seeks us out by making us uncomfortable and we resist. Since life is all about change, we would be wise to buckle up, get curious, and when we can, seek out the growth and wisdom that comes when we are transformed.

I'm struck with this quote, "...transformation is often more about unlearning than learning..." What is it you wish you could unlearn? Maybe it's who we were taught we *should* be, or how it is we *should* act. Perhaps it is the history we learned in school only later to learn it was a half-truth, an untold truth at best, or worse, an outright lie. Then when what we understood to be true is confronted, we must unlearn, doubt all we've heard before, and then reteach. We'll explore this further on Sunday mornings this month.

Winter's waning and I feel the familiar steps of the season's dance, this too is a timeless transformation. I witness now old snow, slick ice, exposed gravel, and the growing rings of bare earth around the tree trunks, and yes, my favorite, the witch hazel is blooming. Look it up, it's an amazing plant! Now the sun wakes me up where there used to be darkness in the morning. I too feel seasonally transformed. How could we not. It is an invitation to unlearn, shift and set free our current understandings. Practice helps. Knowing that we can survive a transformation can assure us that the next one can be survivable too. This is what makes you wise too, dear ones. Who knows what beautiful thing is next, let us lean in curious, durable, and hopeful as our future unfolds.

Soundbites

Transformation.

This theme of the month has me thinking about the variations and possibilities around change. For me, when I hear this word, I immediately go to change for the "better" or the "good." That focus on the positive is a good way to approach the concept.

But, what if transformation means change for the "whatever"?

In music, we change all the time. The key signature, notating which voices sing which parts, how the verses alternate to bring to light different ideas, going from the major to the minor. These all have the effect of showing change to mark a mood or tempo that puts the musician - and the listener - in a different space. And yet, what of chants? Drones? Silence?

During the season of Lent, it is believed that Christ goes into the wilderness for 40 days to seek guidance and strength for a transformation that will bring the oppressors to enlightenment, or perhaps to just steel oneself to the inevitable reality of the end of path one is traveling. Either way, something had to give. That doesn't mean that there is no hope for change, but rather that all shall be well, regardless of the direction. I don't subscribe to the thought that "things happen for a reason" but I do believe that where we take our personal and collective transformations occur when we let the song finish as it was meant to be.

So, my goal this month is to not try so hard to transform the inevitable. I often tell the choir, "if we can nail the beginning and the end of the song, we will be successful." And, if we can convey our meaning in our best effort, then transformation will happen.

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
From your DRE

A Traveler's Guide to the End of The World Tales of Fire, Wind, and Water

by David Gessner


This slightly apocalyptic non-fiction book about climate change might not be very appealing, based on the title. After all, how often do climate catastrophe books (see right there?) sound like Chicken Little. David Gessner has been writing about our deteriorating climate for years. This book, though, has a slightly different focus. As a father of a young daughter, he decided to look at a few of his favorite places in the United States and tell us what science says about how things will look when she reaches his age. As the book begins, she is 19 and he is, as he puts it "sixty-one (Yikes!)" so he includes her thoughts and some insights into what she and her age mates make of this climate crisis.

There are a few things that set this book apart and make it worth reading. He uses some of his favorite places to ground the stories he tells, the changes he documents and the pain particular Americans are experiencing. He retells the history of some places like the Southwest where complex and expansive cultures came and went and he highlights the role played by dramatic changes in climate. He talks about the present and very near future of places like the Outer Banks, reminding us of the temporary nature of those beautiful and ridiculously overbuilt barrier islands which are in constant motion, and always have been and even now moving and changing with increasing speed. It follows, then, that he investigates the future of those huge centers of culture and business such as New York City and Miami already experiencing climate disaster associated with storms and sea level rise.

Gessner ends this by writing, "I am not a climate denier but I do have sympathy for some sorts of denial. I understand that not thinking about a thing might seem to protect us from it. And the way the immediate trumps the long-term.

And so I end without concluding. But I have no conclusions to offer...I don't know what will happen next."

I encourage you to read this. I encourage you to take time reflecting on your own experience, your own favorite places and what happens there. Acknowledge the coming changes and watch for the small things, the small actions that are making a difference around you and support them because we don't know what might make the biggest difference. Enjoy!

In case you missed it, we had a wonderful guest preacher on January 21. Rev. Peter Friedrichs is a retired UU preacher and he shared with us his perspective on liberating love in the context of medical assistance in dying. He also brought associates from New Hampshire Alliance for the End of Life Options for after-worship discussion. This organization in actively, vigorously working for the passage of HB 1283, the proposed legislation before our representatives this year. This is the time to give it all the energy we can provide as the hearing process is underway. As of February 19, the first hearing has taken place. However, the final vote in the Judiciary committee has been set for February 21. Watch the View for updates on this critical vote.

As a result of the urgency in this work, our March outreach offering will be dedicated to supporting this organization. This is tentatively set for March 17 (to be confirmed after the February Board of Trustees meeting). We may not have anyone from this group available to attend. 
It's time to renew SKUUF's Welcoming Congregation designation!

Join the zoom book group March 12 at 3:30 when we will discuss:


My Daughter, My Son: An Adolescent's Gender Transition Ex-

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Meditation Group, Mondays at 6 p.m.

Our meditation group meets every Monday from 6 to 7 pm in the upstairs foyer. We are a small informal group that shares an abiding interest in meditation. Usually, we have between 5 and 10 participants. We are not affiliated with any sect or religion, however we often follow meditations in the Buddhist tradition of Thich Nhat Hanh, Jack Kornfield, Pema Chodron and the like. We generally get together at 6 for brief hellos and pertinent comments. Then a facilitator for the week will offer a short reading or discussion on a meditation topic, followed by a guided meditation, related to the topic. The meditation can be anywhere between 20 and 40 minutes. Afterward we have a short debriefing and discussion of the experience. We adjourn at 7. There is no designated leader of the group and there is no effort to persuade anyone to any point of view.

We welcome newcomers to our group. This group is free and requires no dues or contributions. No previous meditation experience necessary.

About Membership in Starr King Unitarian Universalist Fellowship

What it Means to be a Member

Membership is open to all individuals sixteen years and older regardless of race, creed, national origin, gender or sexual orientation who are in harmony with the visions, goals and principles of Starr King Unitarian Universalist Fellowship.

You are invited to become a member by participating in a Path to Membership orientation or by meeting with the Minister to review the benefits and responsibilities of membership. All new members sign the official Membership Record book witnessed by the Minister or a Membership Committee Chair.

Members are entitled to the services of the Minister and the use of the sanctuary for Rites of Passage (weddings, dedications, memorial services, etc.) at no cost. Members are eligible to serve in elected officer positions and serve as committee chairs. Members have the privilege of full voting rights.

Membership is maintained by active participation in the Fellowship, by supporting the annual Stewardship Drive and/or contributing service toward the Fellowship.

What it Means to be a Friend

A Friend of Starr King UU Fellowship is an individual in harmony with the visions, goals and principles of our Fellowship who chooses not to sign the Membership Record Book. A Friend may participate in any and all Fellowship activities but does not receive Rites of Passage services without a fee, is not eligible to vote or serve as an elected officer or committee chair.

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
