

Hymns that are often sung speak of anticipation and a longing for the arrival of the Messiah. At Starr King, we also sing "People, Look East" and "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" as a musical message of waiting and looking for the coming of Christ. We light the advent candles of Peace, Love, Hope and Joy ever hopeful that all of those lights will shine the truth.

It also is one of the busiest times of the year for many – retail workers, grocery stores, restaurants and yes, even Church Professionals. We are flooded with messages from the media to "act now" and "don't wait" on your gift purchases. The play is an adaptation of the creation story of the Haudenosaunee people past and present (https://native-land.ca/maps/territories/haudenosauneega-confederacy/), adapted from the written version of the story titled 'Skywoman Falling' by Dr. Robin Wall Kimmerer in her book *Braiding Sweetgrass*.

Outreach for December




The December Outreach Fund will go to the UU Action NH Community Bail Fund. The bail fund was established in 2018 and has paid more than 150 bails for people held in New Hampshire jails. It has bonded out 11 immigrants detained by ICE. The Bail Fund frees people stuck in jail waiting for a trial. In many cases, they are accused of misdemeanors such as trespassing and shoplifting.

December 4 is the Sunday to make your contribution and there will be someone from the bail fund to answer questions. All through the month, you can donate online.

The offering at the Christmas Eve service will go towards the minister's Discretionary Fund.

With no access to the web or UU Sunday services, people who are incarcerated can only learn about Unitarian Universalism from the mailings we send them and the letters they exchange with our staff and other Unitarian Universalists like you!

I have been corresponding with two inmates. I write once a month and don't always hear back. (Their lives are complicated.) But when I do they are always so appreciative that I have taken the time to reach out to them.

About Membership in Starr King Unitarian Universalist Fellowship

What it Means to be a Member

Membership is open to all individuals sixteen years and older regardless of race, creed, national origin, gender or sexual orientation who are in harmony with the visions, goals and principles of Starr King Unitarian Universalist Fellowship.

You are invited to become a member by participating in a Path to Membership orientation or by meeting with the Minister to review the benefits and responsibilities of membership. All new members sign the official Membership Record book witnessed by the Minister or a Membership Committee Chair.

Members are entitled to the services of the Minister and the use of the sanctuary for Rites of Passage (weddings, dedications, memorial services, etc.) at no cost. Members are eligible to serve in elected officer positions and serve as committee chairs. Members have the privilege of full voting rights.

Membership is maintained by active participation in the Fellowship, by supporting the annual Stewardship Drive and/or contributing service toward the Fellowship.

What it Means to be a Friend

A Friend of Starr King UU Fellowship is an individual in harmony with the visions, goals and principles of our Fellowship who chooses not to sign the Membership Record Book. A Friend may participate in any and all Fellowship activities but does not receive Rites of Passage services without a fee, is not eligible to vote or serve as an elected officer or committee chair.
